Computer Junk Valuable Someday?

Those old personal computers and programs that you've long since upgraded could be worth a small fortune.

With the 1980s coming to an end, experts say that symbols of the decade, including Swatch watches, Pee-wee Herman dolls and "Baby on Board" signs, will soon become valuable. Likewise, certain models of the personal computer, born in 1977, may someday go for astronomical prices at auctions. Primitive pre-1980 personal computers from companies such as IMSAI, Cromemco, North Star and MITS may someday be worth a mint. Discontinued computers from the early '80s, including Osborne, Commodore PET, early Kaypros, TI 99/4A and Adam, should also have value. The Mindset, which was highly praised for its design and graphics, is rare but valuable.

Ironically, as a computer becomes obsolete and its used-market value drops, it becomes precious on the collectable market.

Computer games and software could become the baseball cards of tomorrow. The original VisiCalc in its shrink-wrapped box could become as highly prized as a 1906 Honus Wagner card. Programs from companies that no longer exist, such as Sirius, Micro Lab, Synapse, Tronix and Romox, should be valuable. Video game systems, especially discontinued Intellivision, Odyssey II, Vectrex and Astrocade, are worth collecting. The *Odyssey 100*, a dedicated *Pong*-style game from 1972, has historical value as the first home video game.

Early computer magazines also are expected to have some value. In particular, the January 1975 issue of *Popular Electronics*, which announced the Altair 8800, one of the first personal computers, and the premiere issues of *Byte* and *Creative Computing* are worth collecting. Bumper stickers, buttons and junk given at computer shows, including wacky products like the Amiga "Joyboard," a silly controller that was ridden like a skateboard and sold to generate capital to produce the Amiga computer, are collectable.

Have you ever seen one of those ads in Computer Shopper or your local newspaper announcing a computer show? Ever wonder what they're all about?

I have, and I finally decided to go to one. I admit that, at face value, the phrase "computer show" conjures up some images to mind. I envision sales people, in dresses and ties (respectively) standing like vultures by the front entrance, waiting to descend on me as I walk in, forcing me to look at the new \$9,000 Cray XT compatible computer with 10,000 gigabytes of memory!

Was I wrong! I was pleasantly surprised to find it wasn't like that at all! What was it like? Well, it was like a big flea market (swap meet to our West coast friends.) There were tables everywhere with people selling only computer equipment. One could find new and used computers, disk drives, printers, modems, disks, printer products... I could go on and on.

I met fellow ADAMite and official MOAUG member Richard Salvati and his son Rich there. (Hmm... three Richs; sounds like we've got money!) That is a story in itself since we'd never met before. Meeting Rich was just another one of those ADAM fringe benefits! We strolled around, looking at what was for sale and getting acquainted at the same time. We found ADAM game controllers, \$3 a pair; memory consoles, \$40; used Digital Data Drives, \$10; and Lo and Behold! We also found Eve Electronic Systems! Eve is now called E.E.S. Companies, and had an 80-column board on display which was extremely well-constructed, as well as a PS-1

power supply which Rich bought at the special show price of \$45!

I spoke with the owner of EES, Hank Szretter, who seemed as surprised to hear about how alive the ADAM world is as we were to have run into him. Hank explained that Eve still manufactures hardware for the ADAM, as well as offering disk drive upgrades or disk format conversions. They still have the same phone number and address:

You can write or call for a free catalog! I had heard Eve was out of the ADAM business and was not answering their phones, but found this to be untrue, especially when I called and Hank himself answered the phone.

Some of the other bargains to be had: 5.25" DS Verbatim disks, \$8.25 for 20; generic disks, 30 for \$8.25; 3.5" Verbatim disks, \$9.75 for 10; PowerPAINT-size labels, \$17.75 for FIVE THOUSAND; disk head cleaners for \$4... again, I could go on and on.

So if you should see an ad for a computer show in your area, by all means, go to it!! The prices are great and there are bargains to be had! Better still, plan to meet another ADAMite there, but don't plan to be home early!!



REEDY'S SMARTTYPE VER 2.1

I just received a most welcome surprise in my mailbox! Jack Reedy has updated an old favorite of mine, SmartTYPE, to Version 2.1. I'm glad to see this revision, because although I liked version 2.0, there were some problems with it if you used it with the ADAM printer. I like my dot matrix just fine, but I also like to be able to use my daisy-wheel; and I know the majority of MOAUG members are still using the daisy-wheel.

I first bought SmartTYPE because I wanted to use the two-column format. At that time, SmartTYPE was the ONLY word processor on the market that would allow you to print out your work in two columns, and to choose whether you wanted a line to be centered, left justified, right-justified, or both left- and right-justified (as you see here.) There are now several other word processors on the market, but I don't own any of them, so I can't compare the features to SmartTYPE. Until I see Jack's newest catalog, I can't even compare the prices!\* But, if you already own an earlier version of SmartTYPE, the cost to upgrade it will be very small. Jack has always made it a policy to offer upgrades to his customers at only a nominal fee. (In some cases, where a bug is discovered immediately after a release, he has even upgraded it free.)

SmartTYPE 2.1 has a new opening screen, fixes the bugs that caused problems printing out on the ADAM printer, and includes a doc file with some new hints on its use, which is rather handy. It is an easy program to use; there are no commands to remember, except for the special function keys (STORE/GET, ESCAPE, CLEAR, MOVE/COPY) and those are pretty obvious. I especially like the MOVE/COPY function which allows you to move instantly to any line of your workspace.

I still see an occasional blank line that occurs once in awhile with the daisy wheel printer, only when I am printing in two-column mode. It is

not really a problem for me, though, and perhaps I'll figure out why it happens at all. I THOUGHT I had found a bug which caused a blank space in place of a letter, but it appears that it was probably my own fault. I had edited some lines and used the cursor key to advance to the next line, instead of using the RETURN key to enter the line. I've had no trouble since I started paying attention to the RETURN key. In fact, I strongly suspect the other "bug" is due to the same error on my part, and does not indicate a problem with the program. All in all, I am quite happy with this revision.

As in earlier versions, this program is really designed to be used with short files. And it does take some time to use, because each line must be entered separately. But it has some really nice features, and turns out good-looking copy. To sum up, you can print in one or two columns, and you can center or justify each line individually. You can insert and delete lines, and move to any line in your text instantly. You can see the directory on your tape or disk from within the program, and you can print hard copy using either the ADAM printer or a dot matrix (for the latter, you have a choice of density, too.) You can NOT use SmartTYPE to write lengthy documents, and you cannot read SmartTYPE documents from the built-in ADAM word processor.

Jerome has been accessing the ECHO for two years, but until now, he had to call a board in Michigan to pick it up. The Midas Touch operates 7 days a week and 24 hours a day. ## POWER PAINT: TIPS & TRICKS

One of the handiest features of Power PAINT is often overlooked by those who are just beginning to explore the program. That is the menu that you can access by pressing the MOVE/COPY key from the main menu. This submenu contains features to copy the cell you are working on into any other cell you like, and to "pull" your screen right & left or up & down. It also contains a SmartKey routine called "SET FRAME". By pressing that key, you can frame a section of your screen, bracketing it by upper left & lower right corners (using the arrow keys to move across the screen and the RETURN key to select the corners.) Once you have set the frame in place, you can choose to copy whatever is in the frame to any location on the screen. You can also erase it if you prefer. That comes in very handy for erasing large blocks of graphics... it is TEDIOUS to erase it one pixel at a time in the DRAW FOREGROUND menu!! One warning, though: do NOT use the "MOVE" option to relocate the contents of your frame. For some reason, this often erases your work instead of moving it. It's much safer to use the COPY function to move it where you want it; then you can always use the ERASE function to delete it

from the old location. Even the pros like Tony Patterson prefer to use this technique rather than risking MOVE.

\* \* \* \* \*

Also, when you are through using Power PAINT, don't forget to reset your dot matrix printer before you exit the program (assuming you have been printing your work.) Otherwise, if you try to go from PowerPAINT to a word processing program, you will find that the printer will print lines of text too close together. Don't be alarmed if this happens... you can easily fix it by turning the printer back off and on again.

\* \* \* \* \*

While it is easy enough to erase large blocks of text by using SET FRAME and ERASE, as mentioned above, it can be a bit time-consuming because you have to set each frame independently. It IS faster than using the ERASE mode in DRAW FOREGROUND, but sometimes it may suit you better to erase by going into the text mode. You access this from the main menu by pressing the INSERT key. Then, when you are asked which fonts you wish to use, choose SPECIAL FONTS and select the size you would prefer to use as an eraser. DOUBLE SIZE gives you a 32 x 32 pixel (or "SPRITE" size) font. So, if you press REPLACE text, instead of OVERLAY, you can use your arrow keys to position the cursor and the spacebar to erase. That may sound confusing, but if you try it, it will become obvious. You can experiment with font sizes to get the size you need at the moment, and you'll find it faster than SET FRAME once you are used to it.

\* \* \* \* \*

If you have an earlier version of Power PAINT and did not buy PaintAID, you may have already encountered the bug that can freeze up your program if you are drawing polygons and you hit the RETURN key without moving the cursor from its last position. It's easy to avoid the problem by remembering to use the ESCAPE key to exit the polygon routine. But, it's also fairly easy to forget to do that, if you don't use the program often. The best insurance is to SAVE your file often. It's also a pretty good idea to get PaintAID and fix that bug. PaintAID includes a variety of fonts to play with, too.

# LEARNING WITH LOGO

## WHAT IS LOGO?

Logo has been described as being both a computer language and a philosophy of learning. The major theme of Logo's philosophy is to learn by doing, to learn by trial and error, to learn by exploring and discovering. Errors do NOT reflect failure, but simply 'bugs' that can be analyzed and fixed.

The language itself was designed to reflect this philosophy by being easy to use and powerful enough for sophisticated applications. Logo achieves these two seemingly opposing goals by incorporating several major design characteristics.

The most important Logo feature is its ability to respond to new user-created words or programs in the same way Logo responds to its built-in words. Every computer language has certain 'reserved' words called PRIMITIVES. In Logo, the "primitives" include such commands as MAKE, AND, IF, REPEAT, FORWARD, and RIGHT. For example, the command **FORWARD 50**

will cause the turtle to draw a line 50 steps long on the screen (going in the same direction as it was already facing) while the command **RIGHT 90**

will turn the turtle 90 degrees to the right. We can create some rather interesting programs using these primitives. Here is one of the easiest programs to visualize:

```
TO BOX
  REPEAT 4 [ FORWARD 50 RIGHT 90 ]
  END
```

Remember to push SmartKey VI after typing this, so that ADAM will store it in the memory, for later recall. Think of it as ADAM remembering what BOX is. Now the key point here is that we can run this program, called a PROCEDURE in Logo, just by typing its name, the same as we run a Logo primitive. We can even include this newly-defined procedure into other procedures. For example, here is a simple procedure that uses our new BOX procedure:

```
TO STAR
  REPEAT 20 [ BOX RIGHT 18 ]
  END      (SMARTKEY VI to save!)
```

Now just enter the command **STAR**, and watch what happens!

The primitive TO is used to enter the Logo editor in order to define new 'vocabulary' words. When a language uses new words just like it uses its built-in words, we say the language is 'extensible' and uses the same 'syntax' for procedures as for primitives. Some words may be abbreviated, such as:

RIGHT = RT FORWARD = FD LEFT = LT BACKWARD = BK

Therefore, our procedures could be written in this shorter form. For example:

```
TO BOX
  REPEAT 4 [ FD 50 RT 90 ]
  END
```

... and the procedure  
for STAR could be  
entered as: ....

```
TO STAR
  REPEAT 20 [ BOX RT 18 ]
  END
```
